INTRODUCTION

GETTING TO 100!

After an action-packed year of well drilling, getting our Samburu Sisters program running, moving our office, growing our Walk for Water event into a national one with satellite walks in 10 cities around the US, adding 3 new members to our board, and finally starting the strategic planning process, 2017 culminated in funding our 100th well at Splash Bash. It was a great year!

In Kenya, our Project Manager moved the organization forward by implementing new programs, collaborating with new partners, and working with our well communities on educational and gardening workshops. We also had our first ever event in Nairobi – Dance for Water in which 50 people learned about TSP and danced the night away. Another milestone from 2017 was achieved when TSP Grants Manager, Kiki Swanson visited Samburu for the first time and met so many of the communities she had only known by their names.

We drilled ten wells with Pass Africa, resulting in the 100th well drilled since the organization was founded in 2005. It was a standard day at the office for our Kenya staff and drill crew but a BIG moment that we will be celebrating throughout 2018. The well drill went very smoothly, albeit a bit delayed due to prolonged flash flooding in Kenya during the beginning of 2018. A 100 Wells Celebration was held at our Samburu office in Wamba on Saturday, 16 June 2018. This is a milestone that we share with every donor, volunteer, intern, supporter that has been involved with TSP since 2005. Together, we have changed people's lives in a profound way. Healthier children, more girls attending school, food security for families, and empowered women with more time for income generating businesses that is cause for celebration!

What's Next?



The Samburu Project embarked on its 10th well drill in Samburu, Kenya. For the 7th year in a row, we engaged the services of Kariuki Waruinge of GroundWaterMax, Nairobi to conduct hydrogeology studies to determine site selections.

Pass Africa, Nairobi was contracted to conduct the actual drilling. Only slightly delayed in schedule, it was a thrilling day when the 100th well was drilled in early 2018.

Hygiene & Sanitation workshops were conducted at each well in March and April of 2018. A county health officer facilitated the workshops to educate the community on proper handwashing, the importance of keeping animals drinking from the trough and people drinking from the spout, and various other issues to keep the well clean and safe.

Our 100th well - Lchoro - in the Westgate area, expands our reach to a new part of Samburu. The Westgate community is in desperate need of water. We were thrilled to find water in Lchoro and to provide this much needed water point. Each well provides access to clean water for 600 - 1,000 people.

WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT WORKSHOP

The Samburu Sisters program got off to a great start in 2017. Partnering with the Pastoralist Child Foundation (PCF), a one-day workshop was conducted for the Ntilal & Lolgerdad well communities near Archer's Post. On July 11, 2017, TSP Executive Director Linda Hooper and PCF Executive Director Samuel Leadisimo kicked off the day with welcome remarks and refreshments.

A full day of lectures by Christine Namunyak (community leader), Julius Leorto (county health administrator) and Elizabeth Lemoyog (community mobilizer and FGM workshop facilitator) was enjoyed by 75 women. Topics of discussion included conflict resolution, personal rights and freedoms, the importance of education, HIV/AIDS education, cultural practices and taboos as it relates to female circumcision.

Feedback from the community was overwhelmingly positive. More workshops are planned for 2018.



SACK GARDENING PROGRAM

With availability of clean water, TSP is teaching women in our well communities how to grow their own food. With a generous grant from the Harbourton Foundation, TSP partnered with Give A Child Life Kenya (GACLK) to pilot a program on door-step gardening. Beginning in September, the staff of GACLK traveled to TSP HQ in Wamba to meet with 25 pre-selected women gardeners. A workshop on how to assemble a sack garden was conducted at TSP HQ. The gardeners returned to their homes with sacks, seedlings of kale and other greens where on site instruction continued. Mercy Jamwelly conducted weekly site visits to each gardener. Challenges with the quality of seedlings undermined the process for some gardeners while others thrived. More sacks were requested and a seed bed was constructed so seedlings would be readily available. With the availability of strong seedlings the program thrived.

Some gardeners were eating their own vegetables in only three weeks after the initial planting. Several gardeners were inspired to plant more sacks and are now selling their vegetables at the local market. Jacinta Lekolii made enough money from the sale of her crops to open a shop where she now sells vegetables along with tea, sugar and other household goods.

COMPLETION OF KAUMBA PROJECT WELL IN KISUMU

After 8 years, the collaboration between TSP and Mwende Pfeffler saw a conclusion with a well and solar pump project in Kisumu. The Kaumba Project was a passion project for Mwende who wanted to put a well in her father's hometown. TSP facilitated and administered the project on the ground. It was a happy day when the well and solar were finally installed in his memory.

MAMA WACHIRA'S ORPHANAGE

A serendipitous meeting between Linda and Kiki and Jason Souza of the EOD Vets group proved to be the beginning of a wonderful collaboration. The EOD Vets, stationed in Archer's Post fell in love with the region and wanted to give back in some way. They adopted the children of Mama Wachira's Children's Home to support with construction of a dormitory and mess hall. After visiting the home, we knew we could lend a hand. Offering the oversight and hands-on involvement with Mama Wachira's, TSP began collecting donations and assisting on the ground with facilitation of program administration. The 14 children who live at Mama Wachira's, all of whom are orphans, are now fed, clothed, sleep in beds at night, and go to school. Most importantly, they now have a proper home. More building projects are planned for 2018 as the home grows to accommodate more orphaned children.

With 250 walkers, raising over \$45,000 for clean water a fun and impactful day was had by all.





The evening concluded with an incredible performance by blues guitar prodigy, Christone "Kingfish" Ingram. Guests danced into the night and out the door.








NAIROBI DANCE FOR WATER (KENYA)

Samburu Project's Walk for Clean Water in Hermosa Beach

n April 30, the Samburu Project will hold its 8th annual Walk for Water Pier to Pier Walk in Hermosa Beach. And, for the first time, walkers across the globe will be joining in the fundraiser.

According to Kiki Swanson, director of development and program administration, as local walkers make their way to the Manhattan Beach Pier and back, the Samburu Project is hosting satellite walks. These walks will be held in other California locations such as Malibu and Woodside as well as in major metropolitan areas including Chicago, Dallas, Denver, Detroit, New York, Phoenix, San Francisco, Stamford, Conn., and London, England.

"This year, we'll have 13 walks throughout the country and abroad," she relates. "Here in the South Bay as always it will be a special day for us. Our community is heavily involved, with lots of local vendors showing up, and Mira Costa High School has a big presence as well. Students are personally involved in fund-raising for the event."

Mira Costa High School students participate in the project through their Model U.N. class and their instructor Bob Timberlake, who is committed to the event. Swanson herself also encourages student interest.

"I come to the high school and explain the Walk for Water and the project itself. We create shareable fundraising pages for the students participating in the Pier to Pier Walk, so they can send it to family and friends and get sponsors," she said.

The Samburu Project has been working with Mira Costa students for six years, and the students represent an integral part of the fundraiser.

"We think it's a really special event because we are raising money for the women in rural Kenya who have no choice and must walk for water. We have a tent set up with jerry cans like those that women use there to carry water. Seeing them and being able to pick them up makes it easier for participants to relate to the experience of carrying cans that weigh 44 pounds when filled with water," Swanson explains.

The event supports The Samburu Project's goal of providing access to clean water, as well as building awareness of a global safe-water crisis, and the poverty issues created by Kenyan women's long walk for potable water. Samburu women can walk up to 12 miles a day, often forced to rely on water from contaminated Samburu community to drill wells providing access to clean drinking water, and have drilled 86 of them to date.


